PART A UPDATES

Our Cleveland TGA Part A program has just entered the first year of a three-year funding cycle. This is the first time that HRSA has allowed for a three-year funding cycle. Later this fall, direct services will be out for bid via RFP (Request for Proposals). This is the time where agencies in our 6county region can apply to be a part of the Part A network and deliver Ryan services. More White information to follow as we get closer to that time.

STATEWIDE INTEGRATED PLAN

The next Integrated HIV Prevention and Care Plan 2022-2026 is currently being developed in coordination with the Ohio Department of Health. This plan will provide direction for ways that our state can impact the HIV landscape for the next several years. Currently, there are 8 affinity groups targeting specific populations/topic areas that will meet over the next several months to inform the plan and ensure each population's barriers are adequately represented.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS



CLINICAL QUALITY MANAGEMENT Committee

The Clinical Quality Management Committee (CQMC) is currently being restructured to be more intentional about our focus, and re-establishing the specific purpose as it relates to informing the CQM program overall. Quality Improvement Projects (QIPs) and monitoring data are not the only aspects of the CQM program, and we are excited to enhance in some other areas. INTERNAL CQM COMMITTEE

As a best practice of the Ryan White Part A grant, a formal Internal CQM Committee was created in January 2022. This committee meets to develop the CQM program and provides direction to the overall Cleveland TGA.

The recipient CQM Program Manager is the Committee Chair and the Part A Supervisor is the Co-Chair. Along with the Supervisor, the Population Health Deputy Director provides oversight and champions the program to the Cuyahoga County Board of Health (CCBH) Senior Leadership Team.

Currently, this committee is undergoing TA (Technical Assistance) with the HRSA (Health Resources & Services Administration) consultant to revise the current CQM plan, and is being written as an 18-month plan, spanning through December 2023. Planning Council Corner



DO YOU HAVE HIV OR NEED HIV-RELATED HEALTHCARE ASSISTANCE?

If your answer is yes, <u>the Cuyahoga County</u> <u>Regional HIV Prevention and Care Planning</u> <u>Council wants to hear from you</u>. The Planning Council's Community Liaison Committee is surveying persons living with HIV (PLWH) across the Cleveland Transitional Grant Area (TGA) to obtain feedback on the type of HIVrelated healthcare services they need and services that are important to them.

<u>The survey is available to take online in "Survey</u> <u>Monkey" or, if preferred, you may obtain a</u> <u>paper copy</u>. To be eligible to take the survey you must be a PLWH and a resident of one of the following six (6) Ohio counties: Ashtabula, Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake, Lorain, or Medina.



The availability of new data, such as quarterly data from the CDC on America's HIV Epidemic Analysis Dashboard (AHEAD), addresses the need for reliable and up-to-date data so EHE priority areas can better coordinate responses to the epidemic at local levels. The AHEAD dashboard provides national, state, and local data for the EHE indicators: Incidence, Knowledge of Status, Diagnoses, Linkage to HIV Medical Care, Viral Suppression, and PrEP Coverage.

Eating Disorders in LGBTQ+ Populations

Individuals who identify as LGBTQ+ are at increased risk for eating disorders due to a variety of circumstances. It is important to understand the risk factors, what to look for, and protective factors when caring for this population.

Common Risk Factors for LGBTQ+ Individuals

- ① Anti-LGBTQ+ bias and stigma
- I Family and community rejection
- ① Gaps in access to care

- ① Media influences
- ① Unrealistic pressure to assume certain appearance expectations

Protective Factors for LGBTQ+ Individuals

- LGBTQ+ affirming care
- Media influences that represent a range of LGBTQ+ bodies and appearances
- Family acceptance

- CLGBTQ+ competent health care providers
- Emphasis on body neutrality and functionality
- ♡ Trauma-informed care

HIV CRIMINALIZATION IN OHIO

"Currently, Ohio's laws around HIV are not based in modern scientific research and are outdated. being written 20 years ago. The current laws do not promote public health and work against current public health initiatives. Lastly, these promote laws an unhealthy and problematic stigma to the individuals living with HIV in Ohio" (OHMM, 2022). The Cuyahoga County Board of Health launched a local social marketing campaign in December 2021 to communicate how lack of knowledge and understanding are barriers to both accessing HIV care and PrEP implementation. The campaign aims to educate both the general public as well as healthcare providers on how to lessen the stigma & identify biases around HIV & sexual health.

The campaign utilizes real world individuals who are living with HIV or taking PrEP to send a message to the public that they should not be devalued based on factors incongruent with providing equitable and high-quality care. Campaign materials are free to share and post on social media.
