### Prevention Program Summary – Recipient Report – M. Kolenz

We are onboarding a new DIS (Disease Intervention specialist) staff member, and have recently brought on two new program managers and two DIS program managers. We are almost at our half way point and, as there is no current news, we are awaiting guidance on the upcoming grant year from ODH (Ohio Department of Health).

### <u>Community Partner Presentation – Liam Haggerty, Director of Street Outreach, NEOCH (Northeast Ohio</u> <u>Coalition for the Homeless)</u>

NEOCH began in the late 1980's, having roots in advocacy and organizing, and upholding our mission to: *"eliminate the root causes of homelessness while loving our diverse community through organizing, advocacy, education, and street outreach."* Our key values are: *Anti-Racism, Community, Compassion, Affirming Dignity, Trauma Informed, Radically Inclusive, Gracefully Accountable, Sustainability, Pro-LGBTQ, Solidarity, Integrity, Justice, and Love.* NEOCH also promotes efforts around pay-to-stay legislation for late renters and pending evictions, and we are currently working on source of income legislation for landlords who are hesitant on accepting housing vouchers. We also lead workshops and training around crisis intervention, trans-affirmation, and providing help for the homeless, which is all available on our website.

As our mission statement guides our work, we are not a shelter provider or housing provider, instead our efforts are more towards connecting people to housing or medical services. As the population we serve is mostly unsheltered, homeless persons, who often opt out of staying in shelters (due to a various policy, health, and safety concerns), NEOCH's primary goal is to connect with folks, where they are and then connect them to a variety of resources such as housing, medical care, mental health services, crisis intervention, and daily living needs. This is all done through our collaboration with other agencies, so if you're interested in becoming a part of our mission, please reach out and let us know.

\*Question: J. Patterson - We have folks in HIV community currently doing vaccines, what do you see with this? \*Response: L. Haggerty – We had something last summer and with uptick now looking at this. One initial issue last year was homeless and HIV positive concerns, on how to navigate that with vaccines and sheltering, but this is now not a challenge.

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### <u>Community Health Update - Julie Patterson, AIDS Funding Collaborative- Findings of HIV Testing Assessment of</u> <u>Landscape of Community-Based HIV Testing in Cuyahoga County Project</u>

This last academic year, the AIDS Funding Collaborative, took on a group of CWRU students to work on a project. These were all health profession students, who we asked for their help on a project geared towards accessing community-based HIV testing. We appreciate the feedback from the presentation at the March 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, as this helped the students identify trends and form opinions, with the goal of making a difference in HIV testing In Cuyahoga County.

<b>Background</b> There are 1.2 million individuals living with HIV in the United States, the CDC (Center for Disease Control) reported in 2020 that 13.8% of those cases were undiagnosed. Characterizing availability of HIV testing is Cuyahoga County could improve access to care and help community organizations make decisions.	Project Goals- Map HIV testing services, testing volume, self-testing availability- Identify trends in community HIV testers' concerns in Cuyahoga County- Improve community organizations' knowledge of testing availability at other testing locations - Update online HIV testing locators with up to date information
Methods - Interviewed community (non-hospital) HIV testing providers in Cuyahoga County and collected information on e.g., testing volume, hours, self-test availability, and provider concerns - Analyzed data for trends and mapped testing availability - Produced written report detailing findings – To be distributed to HIV testing providers in Cuyahoga County	Results- Reached out to 17 organizations – 15 participated- Submitted updated information to HIV testing locators(HIV.gov + CDC/OHIV.gov)- Two (2) locations needed web locator updates; two (2)locations were not in the locators at all- Identified gaps in access- Mapped testing availability- Produced a written report
Additional Results - Cuyahoga community testing sites administer 27,000 HIV tests per year-220 positives (0.8% positive rate) - Forty percent (40%) of the surveyed locations offer at home self- test options - Seventy-three percent (73%) of sites offer rapid testing and 60% offer laboratory testing - Ninety-three percent (93%) of testing sites advertised their services – 73% social media, 40% print materials - Sixty-seven percent (67%) of sites accept walk-ins - Twenty percent (20%) have screening requirements	Primary Concerns for Testing Sites- Funding availability/allocation- Accessibility of their services to the community- Adequate representation of community in their staffHIV Testing Site MappingThis map shows testing volume for community HIVtesting locations in Cuyahoga County.Final Conclusions/TakeawaysMissing and outdated info was corrected in databasesof locators.Self-testing and non-business hours' distribution waslimited and not accessible to some populations.Major concerns for testing sites were fundingavailability and accessibility of their services.

They both gave us a great starting point and frame of reference to begin this project, and we are very grateful for all their tremendous support.
